MEET THE TEACHER **Mr McGlinchey**



What inspired you to become a head teacher?

"I left university with an IT Computing Degree from Manchester University and a good friend of mine, who

was training to become a teacher, always used to tell me how much he enjoyed his work. He inspired me to start my teaching journey. I also feel that teaching is a job where I could give something back and see people progress and develop. Whether it be a teacher developing their skills or students maturing and growing their knowledge."

Did you always want to be a Head Teacher at a secondary school? "Yes, definitely! When I first started training, I always aspired to one day become a Head Teacher. Do you teach any school subjects?

"I have a Computing degree so IT is the main subject that I teach. But when I first came to St. Gregory's I also taught RE to the Y7's. What message do you want to

pass on to your pupils? "My main message is that the

students of St. Gregory's should always believe that they can achieve whatever they want to achieve. If they focus on their goal, they are prepared to fail and bounce back, keep going for what they want, they can succeed." What makes St. Gregory's

Household Support Fund - Winter 2022

The Household Support Fund is the government funding to support vulnerable families with food costs and utility bills. The Government have announced an extension to the Household Support Fund, to cover the period from the 1 October 2022 to the 31 March 2023.

The Household Support Fund is aimed at supporting the most in need in our community across 3 specific sectors of society;

1. Parents with children

2. Those individuals on the lowest of incomes

3. Pensioners within our community

In line with the Government's advice, the eligibility for Warrington's Household Support Fund will be;

- Parents whose children are in receipt of free school meals and are claiming a qualifying benefit
- Individuals in receipt of Council Tax Support or Housing Benefit (in the current financial year)

Pensioners in receipt of either;

- Pension Credit (Savings Credit or Guarantee Credit)
- Council Tax Support or Housing Benefit

Film and PEGI Ratings All films and games

have age ratings which are used to ensure that entertainment content is clearly labelled with a minimum age recommendation based on the content they have. These age ratings provide guidance to consumers, parents in particular, to help them decide whether or not to buy a particular product for a child. When it comes to games, many are suitable for players of all ages, whilst others are only suitable for older children and young teenagers. A specific portion of games on the market contains content that is only appropriate for an adult audience. The PEGI rating considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty. A PEGI 3 game will not contain any inappropriate content, but can sometimes be too difficult to master for younger children. Reversely, there are PEGI 18 games that are very easy to play, yet they contain elements that make them inappropriate for a younger audience. It is an important part of safeguarding to ensure that a child is not exposed to content that is not appropriate for their age. The Dangers of Frozen Water

Frozen water may look solid from the surface, but it will not hold your weight. If you fall though the ice;

•



- Keep calm and call for help.
- If no help is available, spread your arms across the surface of the ice
- If the ice is strong enough, kick your legs and slide onto the ice.
- Lie flat and try to pull yourself to the bank
- If the ice is very thin, break it in front of you
- If you cannot climb out, wait for help, keeping as still as possible
- Press your arms by your side and keep your legs together.
- Once you are safe, go to hospital immediately

If you see someone fall into ice;

- If you see someone has fallen into cold water DO NOT attempt to rescue them, call 999 and reassure them that help is on the way
- If someone is in water shout to them to remain still to conserve energy - DO NOT move around
- If there is rope or a long branch throw that to them for them to hold on to
- If you can't find anything slide them a bottle or football that they can hold onto as a float
