

## **Household Support Fund**

The Household Support Fund has been extended to cover the period from 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2024.

The funding has been allocated by the Department for Work and Pensions to Warrington Borough Council, who will use it to support those in need from Staying Safe Online three specific groups:

- 1. Parents with children
- 2. Those individuals on the lowest of incomes
- 3. Pensioners within our community In line with the government's advice, the eligibility for Warrington's Household Support Fund will be:
- · Parents whose children are in receipt of free school meals and are claiming a qualifying benefit
- Individuals in receipt of Council Tax Support or Housing Benefit (in the current financial year)
- · Pensioners in receipt of either:
- Guarantee Credit)
- Council Tax Support or Housing Benefit

## Previous Recipients of Household Support Fund

If you received Household Support Fund over winter 2022/23, you will not need to apply for Household Support included in the fund and will receive your payments.
