PEGI ratings

All films and games have age ratings which are used to ensure that entertainment content is clearly labelled with a minimum age recommendation based on the content they have. These age ratings provide guidance to consumers, parents in particular, to help them decide whether or not to buy a particular product for a child.

When it comes to games, many are suitable for players of all ages, whilst others are only suitable for older children and young teenagers. A specific portion of games on the market contains content that is only appropriate for an adult audience.

The PEGI rating considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty. A PEGI 3 game will not contain any inappropriate content but can sometimes be too difficult to master for younger children. Reversely, there are PEGI 18 games that are very easy to play, yet they contain elements that make them inappropriate for a younger audience.

Domestic Abuse

Anyone can be a victim of domestic abuse, regardless of gender, age,

ethnicity, religion, socioeconomic status, sexuality or background.

Children who witness domestic abuse are also victims of domestic abuse.

Signs You Are In An Abusive Relationship

A lot of people do not realize that they are in an abusive relationship. Here are some of the signs that you could be in an abusive relationship that you need to get out of...

- Your partner sexually or physically abuses you. If they ever make you have sex with them when you don't want to, hit you, shove you, or push you, this is domestic abuse.

- Your partner threatens you or your family.

- Your partner puts your down. They attack your capabilities, mental health, looks, or intelligence. They blame you for their violent outbursts.

- Your partner is jealous. They may isolate you from your family or friends or they may accuse you of not being faithful.

- Your partner is possessive. They may check up on you all of the time and they may get angry if you hang out with certain people.

- Your partner has strangled you, beat you, or hit you in the past.

Emotional Abuse

Emotional abusers look to chip away at your feelings of independence and self-worth. You can end up feeling like you do not have anything without your abusive partner or that there is no way out of your relationship.

Emotional abuse includes verbal abuse. This includes controlling behaviour, intimidation, isolation, shaming, blaming, name-calling, and yelling. Abusers who use psychological or emotional abuse will often throw about threats of physical violence, as well as other repercussions if you do not do what they demand.

If you believe that you are a victim of domestic abuse you are not alone and there is support available:

Ask for ANI is a code that you can use at participating pharmacies. They will then provide a space, phone and ask if you need to contact the police.

UK SAYS NO MORE is working with Boots, Morrisons pharmacies, Superdrug pharmacies, Well pharmacies, independent pharmacies, HSBC, TSB, The Co-operative bank and selected Metro banks across the UK to provide Safe Spaces in their consultation rooms for people experiencing domestic abuse.

You can ask for a 'Safe Space' and many will also respond to 'ANI'. They will also provide a space for people to contact the police. <u>Safe Spaces</u> <u>Locations - UK SAYS NO MORE has</u> further information.

Attendance & Punctuality

At St Gregory's Catholic High School, we set a target of 97% attendance to ensure that pupils are in school and making the most of their learning as well as to encourage them to develop good habits for life. We are very pleased with the attendance and punctuality of the vast majority of our pupils, and this is celebrated with through weekly 100% them attendance rewards. Parents are able to see their child's attendance and punctuality as well as the number of achievement and behaviour points on SIMS parent app.

If your child is unwell and unable to attend school, then please remember that you must contact the school absence line to inform school of this. This should be done in advance of 8.40am and must be done on each day of absence. If school have not heard from you, a text message will be sent to your mobile number informing you that your child/ward is absent – this is part of our Safeguarding procedures. All pupils should arrive at school no later than 8.40am so that they are ready and in their form rooms by 8.45am. It is important that pupils are in form on time as this ensures a positive start to the day and pupils are present to take part in collective worship and hear notices that are being given out.

Appointments – where possible please avoid making appointments for your child during the school day as this can be disruptive to their education. If it is necessary for your child to attend an appointment during the school day, then please contact the attendance team in advance of the appointment providing evidence of the appointment. When collecting your child please go to the main reception to inform them that you have arrived at school.

Uniform/mobile phones/smart watches and ear buds

Thank you to all parents/carers for supporting us in ensuring pupils are wearing the correct uniform to school. As a polite reminder pupils should wear a formal shoe, trainers are not permitted; hoodies are not allowed, only a school jumper can be worn underneath the school blazer. A coat may be worn to and from school and outside at break and lunch if a pupil is cold.

Pupils are allowed to wear one small pair of ear-rings in the lower lobe of their ears, no other piercings are allowed. A small cross and chain may be worn but other jewellery including rings and bracelets are not allowed. Make- up, including false nails, false eyelashes and nail varnish is not permitted and pupils will be asked to remove these if they are worn to school.

Mobile phones should be switched off and not be taken out during the school day. If a pupil breaches this then the device will be confiscated overnight in line with our mobile phone and behaviour policy. Likewise, ear buds should also be put away and not taken out during the school day. Notifications should be switched off on smart watches so that pupils are not receiving texts etc on their smart watches. Thank you for your support with regards to this.
